SINCE our last newsletter in the Fall, we've received two new additions to our community, and elected a new prioress! In October, Sister Natalie entered the monastery to begin her postulancy. Sr. Natalie is from Florida but attended school in New York, where she just graduated from Columbia with a PhD in Chemistry. Her father and brother traveled up to New Jersey to attend her entrance, and she brought quite a crowd of friends with her as well!

At the end of November, we received another addition to our community, as we welcomed Sister Mary Agnes of the Infant Jesus Baudo, OP from the Monastery of Our Lady of the Rosary (yes, the same name!) in Heath, Ohio. Sr. Mary

Agnes is 90 years young and says that you are never too old for a new adventure! Sr. Mary Agnes has been a wonderful addition to our community.

In December, Sister Mary Martin's term of office as prioress came to a close and the community elected Sister Joseph Maria of the Holy Family, OP as our new prioress on December 10<sup>th</sup>. Sr. Joseph Maria served our community as novice mistress for six years prior to her election as prioress. When a new prioress is elected, she makes new appointments to the various responsibilities around the monastery, so Sisters were eager to find out what they would be doing for the next 3 years! As the saying goes, 'variety is the spice of life,' so while it takes a bit to get adjusted to new assignments, it is also a great blessing to be able to take on new charges and perhaps even discover new talents. Sr. Denise Marie was appointed as subprioress, and Sr. Mary Magdalene as our new novice mistress.

# SISTER MARIA AGNES OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, O.P. (1931-2023)

Sister Maria Agnes of the Good Shepherd, O.P. passed away peacefully in her sleep at 11:45pm on Saturday, March 18, 2023. While she had been slowly declining and had to be moved to a nursing home to receive 24-hour care, her death was nonetheless a surprise. Her "Good

Shepherd" called her to himself on the eve of Laetare Sunday, and as we sang the entrance antiphon the next morning, we couldn't help thinking of Sister as we sang, "Rejoice ye with Jerusalem, all you who love her! Rejoice for joy with her, all you who mourn for her."

Sr. Maria Agnes was born Nelya S. Karasig on January 2, 1931 in Malolos, Bulacan, in the Philippines. Her parents, Jose Domingo Karasig and Cornelia Santiago Karasig, were both writers and Sister inherited from them a love for the written word. She also had a strong gift for music, being trained as a concert pianist. She converted to the Catholic faith while in college and felt drawn to the religious life. She graduated from the University of the Philippines, Quezon City, with a

degree in liberal arts before entering the Congregation of Dominican Sisters of St. Catherine of Siena in 1954, a community of teaching Sisters in the Philippines. She made first profession of vows on July 15, 1956 and final profession on May 31, 1961. During her time in the congregation she taught high school English, Spanish and religion and was a college instructor in theology, Spanish and music.

In August of 1973 she transferred here to the Monastery of Our Lady of the Rosary, Summit, NJ in order to fulfill her long-held desire for the contemplative life. She made solemn vows in the monastery on March 19, 1977. Just a few months later, in August of 1977, she returned to the Philippines with four other nuns to found a monastery of Dominican nuns there. She supported the




foundation for several years before returning to here to the monastery in Summit, feeling called to make this her permanent home. On November 3, 1994, she became an American citizen. In 2003 the Cainta community elected her their prioress and she returned to the Philippines for three years to lead the sisters in living out their vocation.

In our monastery, Sr. Maria Agnes served as librarian, archivist, chantress and organist, as well as doing a myriad of odd jobs with great generosity. She had an incredible memory, playing all of her piano pieces from memory, including many she learned in childhood, and had an amazing ability to recall people she met decades ago with the precise date and circumstances of their meeting! Very gifted intellectually, she loved to learn and study, and was always eager to ask



questions whenever lecturers came to us. Even towards the end of her life as she became more and more physically limited, she wanted to help the other sisters, whether preparing vegetables in the kitchen or folding laundry as she was able. She suffered from severe spinal stenosis which caused her to become increasingly bent over, and in constant pain. She offered this continual suffering up for the souls in purgatory and all the many other intentions which she carried in her heart. She would say that the doctors always wanted to make her completely pain-free, but we have to suffer in this life - we can't be completely without pain, with nothing to offer to God. Please join us in praying for the happy repose of her soul!



We've recently begun a project to restore the historic grotto built at the very beginnings of our monastery's history, at the time of the very first Rosary Pilgrimage in 1921. This grotto was the site of pilgrimages with crowds of thousands of faithful from across the country, and the Sisters received a number of reports of miracles received after praying in the grotto. However, after the building of our permanent monastery, pilgrims began to come to pray in the monastery chapel instead, and the grotto began to become run-down and neglected. Originally located just outside the enclosure wall, in 1991 when a section of the wall near the grotto needed repair, the wall was moved to bring the grotto inside the enclosure so that the Sisters could use it as a space for private prayer. But the effects of time and humidity continued to work on the grotto, and its condition has deteriorated to the point that we are no longer able to use it as a space for prayer.

In 2018 when we held an open house for the dedication of the new addition to the monastery, some friends of the monastery came across the Grotto and, hearing about its history, approached the community about beginning a project to restore the Grotto to save its history and to allow us to use it once again as a place of prayer.
